Protecting Lao workers' rights, interests 'important': Chinese ambassador

The Chinese Embassy to Laos attaches great importance to protecting the rights and interests of Lao nationals working for Chinese companies, China's Ambassador to Laos Wang Wentian told the Minister of Labour and Social Welfare last week.

The ambassador and Dr Khampheng Saysompheng met to discuss ways to ensure effective performance by Lao workers employed by Chinese firms, while ensuring their rights and interests were protected.

Mr Wang said the embassy was pleased to cooperate with the ministry and relevant Lao sectors in this matter.

He told Dr Khampheng that Chinese contractors working on the Laos-China railway had run free training courses in Luang Prabang province in a bid to improve the skills of Lao workers so they could work competently.

Unfortunately, not many people attended the courses.

Training sessions were arranged for 30 people each but only 30 participants in total turned up for the last three sessions, the ambassador

"After undergoing training, Lao workers can use their skills to work not only on the railway but for other development projects," Mr Wang told the minister through an interpreter.

Mr Wang promised that his embassy would do its best to uphold the rights and interests of Lao workers employed by Chinese companies.

Wages must be paid on time and Lao laws and regulations complied with, he added.

This is part of protecting the rights and interests of Lao workers," the ambassador said.

He asked Dr Khampheng to inform the embassy if the ministry received a report suggesting that a Chinese company had infringed Lao law concerning labour matters.

Mr Wang promised the embassy would act if it received such a report.

According to the embassy, more than 200 enterprises from China are now doing business in Laos.

In a press conference held at the embassy last week, the ambassador told Lao and Chinese reporters that the Chinese government had mechanisms in place to regulate and manage Chinese companies investing overseas.

Companies wanting to invest in foreign countries need to be registered with the relevant Chinese authorities before going abroad. They must also be registered with Chinese embassies in the countries where they are working. This helps prevent poorly-operating companies from going abroad, the ambassador said.

Agricultural developers partner in Champassak agri-business venture

Development Co., Ltd. (PADC) is partnering with India's Kalang Organics Private Limited (KOPL) to grow crops on 1,500 hectares in Mounrapamok district, Champassak province.

The two parties last week signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) at the Champassak Grand Hotel in Pakxe district, to create a joint venture in the cultivation of crops for sale to domestic and international markets.

The MOU was signed by PADC President Ms Bounmy Keosipaseuth and KOPL Chairman Mr Jitu Goswami. The signing was witnessed by Champassak provincial Governor, Dr Bounthong Divixay. The two parties plan to develop agriculture in Mounrapamok district through commercial crop production, animal husbandry, food processing, and agro-marketing.

They plan to work together for a mutually beneficial and strategic alliance in the agro-

marketing business.

Pavina Agriculture necessary infrastructure for growing rice, vegetables and fruit, as well as livestock rearing, and will build a rice mill with a warehouse and

KOPL will provide financial and technical assistance and seek markets. The profits will be shared equally between the two partners.

Speaking at the signing ceremony, Dr Bounthong said the agreement would help to drive the province's agricultural development.

He reminded the two parties to comply with all aspects of the law and ensure their projects operated efficiently.

The government is pushing for increased cooperation in trade, investment, connectivity and agriculture between Asean and India as both sides mark the 25th anniversary of their dialogue relations, Minister to the Prime Minister's Office, Mr Alounkeo Kittikhoun, said while heading a Lao

delegation at the Asean-India PADC will prepare the Business and Investment Meet and Expo in New Delhi on January 23.

According to a report by the Asean India Business Council on the past 25 years, Asean and India have enhanced their economic integration through the finalisation of the Asean-India Free Trade Agreement in 2010.

With a combined population of nearly 2 billion people, about 25 percent of the world's population, Asean and India are among the most dynamic and fastest growing economies in Asia.

To celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Asean-India Dialogue, the Asean-India Expo and Forum took the theme of Strategic Economic Partnership and Connectivity to help realise the untapped economic potential and strategic partnership between the 10 Asean member states and India through the expansion of bilateral trade and investment and people-topeople contacts.

Udon Thani province in Thailand. Mahosot sustained," he said. Hospital wants to base its management on international standards," he said.

All of the major public hospitals in Vientiane including Mahosot are set to undergo infrastructure and medical equipment upgrades to bring them closer to international standards over the next few years.

"I think that good leadership and hospital management does have a strong impact on improving the quality of service in hospitals. That is why this project is supporting the management workshop," Dr Bounthaphany added.

"A fundamental cultural shift is needed in Lao hospitals. The management team should encourage all staff to be more responsive to the needs of patients. Good teamwork by all professionals has to be set in motion and

Staff at every level must be fully committed to patient care and management teams should ensure that their staff are accountable role models, as well as motivating and empowering all team members to work to the best of their ability.

He noted that Mahosot was improving its management in cooperation with the Swiss Laos Hospital Project.

Swiss consultant Dr Alphons Schnyder, who is co-leading the workshop, said there was strong potential to use resources more efficiently.



Pakngum farmers urged to use modern farming methods to boost crop yields

Pakingum district in Vientiane has the potential to commercially grow rice and a variety of vegetables that can meet the needs of the capitals markets.

District officials are encouraging people to use modern farming methods in a bid to reduce the amount of labour needed for farm work by about 10 percent a year. "In the past, district officials did not know about new farming methods and didn't use modern technology in agriculture, but now they will try to help local people use modern equipment to reduce the amount of manual labour required," district Governor Mr Vongdeuane Bounyaseng said. Some villagers are now using rice harvesters and growing organic vegetables. In one week, the district can provide 1.5 to 2 tonnes of crops and grow grass to feed cattle, he said. With support from the authorities, the district now has 35 pig farms, 16 chicken farms, six duck farms and one partridge farm, which supply markets in Vientiane, Mr Vongdeuane said.

He said district officials also helped to educate Party members and officials about the policies of the Party and government to make the country self-sufficient while prioritising district development and reducing poverty rather than waiting for assistance from the authorities.

Sisattanak students get lesson in dangers of drugs, careless driving

Sisattanak district police carried out a drive last week to inform students about the dangers of drug abuse and road accidents.

Talks were given at Thongkang Secondary School and several other institutions in Sisattanak district. Drug abuse is widespread and many youngsters have become drug dealers, which has led to an upsurge in crime including robberies and burglaries, as well as road accidents. The students were advised not to use drugs and to avoid becoming addicted. They should use their free time to play sports, do research or study, and get involved in useful activities.

In 2017, many crimes were recorded in Sisattanak district, including 221 cases of theft and 110 drug-related cases, which resulted in police detaining 224 people. Last week, police educated 36 young drug users about the dangers of their lifestyle before sending them back to the care of their parents. They were told to engage in positive activities and warned that people with serious drug problems would be sent to the rehabilitation centre.

District police also arrested five alleged drug dealers at a gaming shop in Xaysettha district after finding 30 amphetamine tablets in their possession.

Old Buddha images discovered in Vientiane province cave

Officials in Meun district, Vientiane province, have discovered many old Buddha statues in a cave located between Vang and Namhy villages.

On March 13, the Governor of Meun district, Mr Phouvone Bounvilay, went with authorities and local officials to see the cave at Homthao, about 27 km from the centre of the district on National Road No. 4501.

Earlier, officials checked the cave after local residents informed them that it contained Buddha images believed to be hundreds of years old.

Officials also found four other caves that could be opened up to tourists. They said visitors could see the Buddha statues, go for a walk in the woods, and admire the Mekong River. Mr Phouvone said they would develop the area and the cave as a tourist attraction. "Initially, we will clear the area to create space for parking and build a restaurant and toilets for use by visitors," he said. It is expected that the cave with the Buddha images will be opened to the public before Lao New Year next month.

Luang Namtha drug bust snares 100,000 amphetamine tablets

Police in Luang Namtha province detained an alleged drug dealer and seized

100,000 amphetamine tablets in his possession on March 12. Police said they detained the man after a tipoff from local residents on March 11 that a drug deal would take place somewhere between Sompantay and Xiengkok villages. On March 12, police formed a special unit to put their target under surveillance. At 1.30 pm, they found the target along the road between the two villages and found 100,000 amphetamine tablets in a bag. Police held Mr Yato, 31, from Poungxay village, Long district. During questioning, he admitted to owning the tablets and said he had bought them from a drug dealer in Myanmar. Mr Yato is currently in custody and investigations are continuing in the hope of tracing others involved.
